Sibi George, India's Ambassador to Japan, argued that Japan is more than just a partner but also a very important collaborator. He pointed out that the combination of Japan's technological capabilities and India's huge market and innovation ecosystem can give rise to powerful synergies.

Tatsuo Yasunaga, Chair of the Board of Directors at Mitsui & Co., said, "While Japan possesses technology, knowledge, and experience, India and Africa offer markets and plenty of high-quality human resources. Linking the area from Asia to Africa organically, and achieving cooperation and development, can lead to sustainable growth."

Marie-Laure Akin-Olugbade, Senior Vice President of the African Development Bank, reported that the government of Japan and the African Development Bank Group at TICAD8 announced \$5 billion in financial assistance to Africa. According to her report, over the past 10 years, 42 African countries have benefited from around \$12 billion in economic support from the Indian government.
